Bob Kendrick was named President of the Negro Leagues Baseball Museum (NLBM) in March 2011. Founded in 1990, the NLBM is the world's only museum dedicated to preserving and celebrating the rich history of African-American baseball and its profound impact on the social advancement of

And while he doesn't fashion himself to be a historian, Kendrick has become one of the leading authorities on the topic of Negro Leagues Baseball history and its connection to issues relating to sports, race and diversity. He has been a contributing writer for "Ebony Magazine" and the national Urban League's "Opportunity Magazine."



TRACY MARTIN

"THE HISTORY OF BASEBALL UNIFORMS"

Tracy C. Martin is a baseball collector and historian. His love for history and baseball collided when he began playing vintage base ball for the "OHIO VILLAGE MUFFINS". He is the founder of the Baseball Collectors Hall of Fame, Vintagebaseballcollector. com a website set up to honor those who have a passion and knowledge to research and preserve artifacts of our national pastime.

TRACY MARTIN'S VINTAGE BASEBALL MUSEUM

Dedicated to preserving baseball, our national pastime through research, collecting, and displaying baseball memorabilia. I have been collecting since 1975 and my dream was to amass a timeline that would show the evolution of Baseball with equipment and memorabilia. Today my collection consist of over 2,000 items dating back to the 1850's.

HENRY CHADWICK

The father of baseball

During a VBBA board meeting earlier this year, a question arose about scoring, specifically what were the forms used by teams in the 1860s.

Many teams had official scorers and games were often recorded by scorers from both teams — who were then named in early box scores. Discussion of the topic quickly led to Henry Chadwick. Who was Henry Chadwick? And why should today's vintage base ball players and teams care?

The answer is simple. As stated on the cover of Andrew Schiff's excellent biography, Chadwick has a claim to being the father of baseball.

As recent historians have demonstrated time and again, there is no single individual who created the game. Instead, you have people like Daniel Lucius "Doc" Adams, who contributed a piece here and a piece there, forming the mosaic known as baseball. Much of their work was witnessed — and reported — by Henry Chadwick.

The English immigrant and music teacher was not the first sports reporter in pre-Civil War America but he proved to be the most consistent and influential. For Chadwick, baseball was not only a game he loved but a way to reform American sport.

Crossing Elysian Fields on his way back to the Hudson River ferry, Chadwick passed a baseball game, lingered to watch, and was struck with the idea that the game was exactly the pastime for the bustling, growing United States of the 1850s.

Chadwick had definite ideas about not only how it should be played but the game's goals. The product of a multi-generational reform-minded English family (his half-brother Edwin

Chadwick is a big deal in 19th century British history), Father Henry, as he came to be called, viewed the game as a teaching tool. He advocated scientific base ball and gentlemanly conduct.

For those living today who have been inundated by statistics our whole lives, it is hard to imagine the wonder and promise numbers offered to mid-19th century reformers. Statistics, they believed, could establish the need for reforms ranging from public water supplies to sewage systems to personal health practices. But first, one had to get the

And so, Chadwick borrowed a scoring system used in cricket to create early versions of today's box and line scores. He pioneered the batting average, though he downplayed pitching because, as we know, the pitcher's early role was to get the ball to a spot where the batter could hit it. The real play was in the batting and the fielding.

Chadwick's early scoresheets can ache the head of modern readers. Nothing seems to make sense and the scoresheets often require double entries — the scorer tracking both offense and defense at the same time on two different charts. But it was a start. Everything that followed sprang from it.

So, we owe Henry Chadwick honor, especially as his persistence, stretching into 1908, directly led to his death from pneumonia spawned by a cold caught attending an opening game of the 1908 season in Brooklyn.

Much more about Chadwick is to be found in Schiff's excellent book, "The Father of Baseball: A Biography of Henry Chadwick."
